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Strawberry I at Heather Ridge has a neighborhood watch program

With its Neighborhood Watch Program, Strawberry I has one Area Coordinator — Cathie Brailey in Phase I and one Block Captain — Brent Weynand in Phase II. These are positions approved and appointed by the Aurora Police Department. In order to perform in either position, the Aurora Police do a background check, insuring the people in these positions have no criminal background and can serve the community.

I am fortunate to be the Area Coordinator for Strawberry I at Heather Ridge, also known simply as "Strawberry." I have been in this role for a little over a year now. The Neighborhood Watch program is still young, but a good structure is in place and it continues to grow. The program functions under the auspices of the Aurora Police, more specifically Police Officer Mark Lowisz, and Area 10 Head Area Coordinator Steven Noi. These people guide me and approve any activities performed in our community.

One of the most important tools Strawberry community has in place is a Neighborhood Watch Email Alert system, Strawberryhoodwatch@yahoo.com. This is an email distribution list of people in the Strawberry community who have requested their emails be included so they can receive Neighborhood Watch (NW) Bulletins. When the Aurora police or surrounding police departments have

an urgent bulletin or information they want distributed to the communities, they send the announcement/bulletin to the Head Area Coordinators in Aurora who in turn notify the Area Coordinators in each community within their area.

I monitor the email daily for Strawberry and distribute the Neighborhood Watch bulletins/announcements to residents. In this way information is disseminated quickly. It's my responsibility to also protect the

emails of the people on the distribution list. The bulletin is sent out without the email addresses displayed. If someone were to abuse the distribution for any reason, it is my responsibility to remove them from the list.

Metro District, HOAs and United Associations of Heather Ridge

Many Heather Ridge residents do not know the differences between a metropolitan district and a homeowners association (HOA), especially when it comes to how they are created, what powers each has, and to whom they are accountable.

The Heather Ridge Metro District No. 1 (HRMD No.1) was created under Revised Colorado Statutory law, specifically Title 32. HRMD No. 1 is a quasi-municipal corporation and political subdivision of the State of Colorado (i.e. a form of local government) created for a specific purpose — to preserve the Heather Ridge open space! Its controlling documents include: City of Aurora model Service Plan, HRMD No. 1/City Intergovernmental Agreement, and any bond restrictions.

All Heather Ridge HOAs, except for Country Club Ridge, were created in the early 1970s when no specific controlling law existed. Starting in 1985, the Legislature passed the Colorado Common Interests Ownership Act (CCIOA) as part of Title 38 law; later modified by Senate Bills 89 and 100, which incorporated very specific rules and regulations. Developers create HOAs when undivided common area interests and community costs are shared by owners. Controlling documents may include: Declarations, Articles of Incorporations, By-laws, Covenants-Conditions-Restrictions (CC&Rs).

The Heather Ridge HOAs and HRMD No.1 do not have a legal relationship and operate as separate private and public entities respectively. What makes a metro district unique is its power to issue debt and tax real property to fund administration and/or bond debt service — a lien that's impervious to foreclosure or bankruptcy. HOAs collect fees/dues from owners, and their collection process is limited in law, especially by foreclosure and bankruptcy.

All metro districts are accountable to the state, their county or city jurisdiction and to district property tax payers (with recourse through elections, regulatory agencies, and the courts). HOAs are accountable to their owners through their controlling documents, court precedents and legislation specific to HOAs. Metro districts are different entities from HOAs with different powers and rules.

Lastly, the United Association of Heather Ridge (UAHR) was created to influence golf course open space development. Now that HRMD No. 1 owns the golf club-course, UAHR's new mission is community leadership! It is very important that HOA Boards and residents be involved, because UAHR advises the HRMD No. 1 on select matters. Although there's no legal relationship between the HRMD No. 1 and UAHR, they have common interests in the community's well-being and the golf club's success.

Headrick's report included personal interviews with Heather Ridge residents saying they bought here for the quiet neighborhoods, golf atmosphere, and great real estate values.

Market Conditions! What made for a hot real estate market last year is making for a slow one now — the government's \$8,000 tax credit is gone! It helped first time buyers and eager sellers move inventory, but like the "cash for clunkers" car program in 2009, the real estate market is taking a breather.

Sales activity is slowly recovering as interest rates remain stable. Low rates help also, but stability is most important. Security: The contract with a security company was terminated at the end of July. The board is presently discussing with other communities what companies to consider hiring.



Day at the Track: Several of our residents attended the Golf Course – Home Owners collaborative effort for a See Cobblestone, page 7

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

Heather Ridge South by Vicki Braun





Pond Work: Our aquaculturist was on site in July and put the necessary chemicals in and around our two ponds below the clubhouse. Ponds and kids do not go well together.

Rain Sensors: Rain sensors have been installed on all irrigation controllers. They are programmed to shut off if there is 0.25-inches of rain or more. Some old clocks that are not compatible with these units are being replaced. This should keep the sprinklers from coming on in the middle of a huge rainstorm, saving considerable

money. So far, Strawberry is the only community in the district using this idea.



they wish to share with the rest of the community anonymously (i.e., if your car was broken into and you want to make others aware to be on the look out). Depending on the message, it is distributed to the rest of the community or forwarded to the police (if requested). Always call the police at 911 first, if a crime happens to you.

People on the distribution list for 'NW Bulletin Email Alert' also receive statistical crime reports from the Aurora Police. These reports are helpful to the people in the community because they show where the crimes are being committed in and around our neighborhood. It shows maps and lists addresses. In this way, everyone can be on the alert towards preventing the same crimes from happening around us and to our neighbors.

Strawberry has a Neighborhood

Watch monthly meeting that is held the second Wednesday evening at the Strawberry Clubhouse. All are welcome. The meeting starts at 6 pm and usually runs for one hour. The meeting is informal. The discussion is usually about the latest bulletins, information on how to be an effective member of Neighborhood Watch, and safety in the Strawberry community.

The Neighborhood Watch program is also part of an Emergency Readiness initiative in the city of Aurora. There will be more information about this at the National Night Out at Utah Park on Tuesday evening, Aug. 3, 5–8 pm.

If you miss Tuesday night, information on how to become involved with Emergency Readiness through the Neighborhood Watch program

will be in the NW Bulletin Email Alerts during the next few months.

Good communication is the key for Neighborhood Watch. Remember to always dial 911 in any emergency. If you have any doubts about an action taking place, call the police nonemergency number, 303-627-3100, report it and let the police check it out. It's better to be safe than sorry, so the saying goes.
